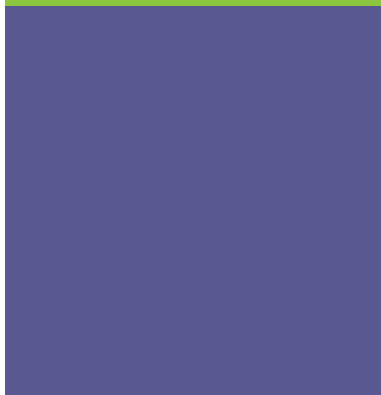

From Our President & CEO

We are listening and carrying out our mission—To build relationships between donors and community needs.

It is very humbling and gratifying to see so many individuals make the decision to become part of our GMCF family of funds. It took our foundation ten years to reach \$10 million in assets, ten more years to reach \$100 million and only one more to reach \$200M. \$215,413,469 to be exact. It took us fourteen years to reach the \$1 million mark in grants to the community. Last year alone, GMCF granted \$16,904,991.28 from its more than 1,300 funds to community programs and efforts. It's obvious that the more we give, the more we receive and that is what philanthropy is all about.

There is no question that the booming markets have treated our asset investments well. The work of our investment committee and professional advisors deserve a great deal of credit for our growth, and we are grateful for their efforts and due diligence for the benefit of all our funds.

I want to share a few highlights of some benchmarks that we track in our work to serve our communities and fund holders. Here are a few 2021 GMCF numbers to reflect on; \$215 million in total assets with a growth of \$84 million, \$62,971,808 in gifts and grants received, \$16,904,991.28 in grants to the charities, \$1,454,435 in newly endowed funds, \$298,636 scholarships awarded, \$273,969 received in the YES! Fund Campaign, 14 new endowments established, \$1,486,434 received from Grow Green Match Day and \$4,289,990 million from all GMCF administered match days. These numbers are a summary of the efforts from our family of funds—fifteen community foundation partners, four educational foundation partners, and four supporting organization partners.

2021 also saw our foundation move into newly renovated and expanded offices, in the same office building but different location. Our staff grew to eleven (four full-time), and we continue to expand services to our fund holders. Our marketing efforts expanded into more social media and the launching of the "Philanthropy Today" podcast series. We are proud to let you know that our vision for our impact is much greater, and the future is bright and exciting.

In summary, I want to say "thank you" to our fund holders, donors, advisors, Trustees, board members and staff for the continued support received. GMCF will continue to encourage donors to think outside the box, finding new ways to fulfill their passion and impact lives. Together, we will create great stories that will be their lasting legacy.

I also want to commend the staff of GMCF for their creative leadership in recognizing the needs in the community and embracing it as an opportunity to create a better life for Manhattan and our surrounding partners.

It has been an honor to serve as the board chair in 2021 and participate in the many ways of connecting donors with opportunities to change the lives of many. As we move into 2022, I want to thank everyone who has made the choice to be part of the GMCF story.

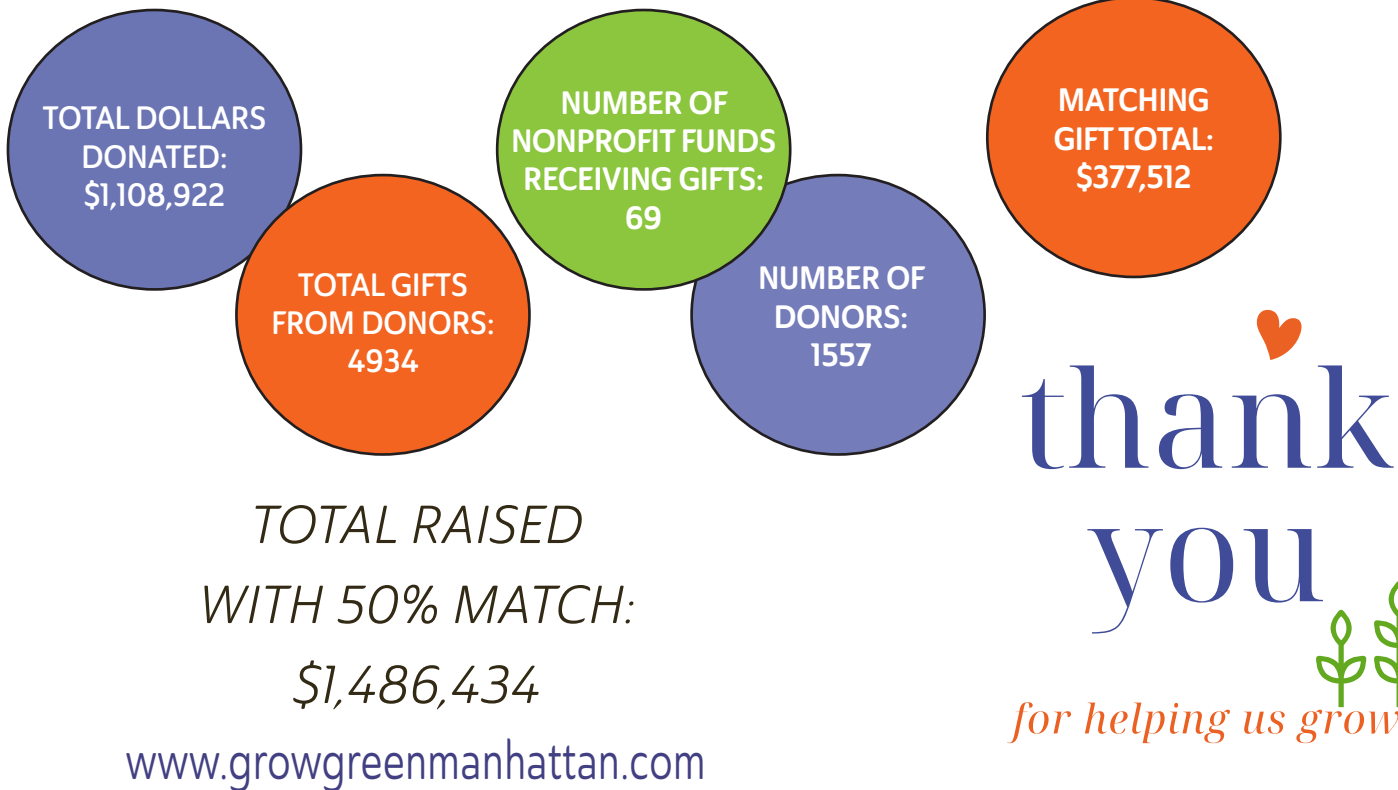

Taken Too Soon Fund

Steve and Diana Havenstein experienced something that no parent should ever have to, the loss of a child. Their oldest son, Greg, died due to a tragic traffic accident July of 1996. Steve said, "It is especially difficult when there is no illness or physical notice of any kind preceding the loss, just life as usual today and upside down tomorrow." They were a typical young family of five, trying to make do.

Over the years that followed, the Havenstein's helped other families who found themselves in a similar situation. Especially, in memory of Greg, trying to find something that was meaningful. When they last donated financially to a cousin's daughter after she lost a son, Steve and Diana realized that they had to do something that was not a one and done event, there had to be something lasting.

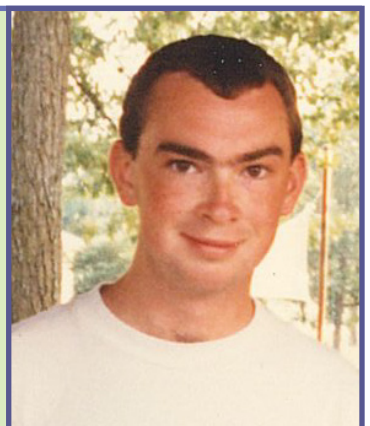
They considered benches, bricks engraved in memory of, signs where donations have been made and realized all of these were good, but just didn't feel like it was a living memory to their son and family. They wanted something that would continue on, and help time and time again. "After losing a child, often there is extended loss of work, many times sibling counseling is necessary and marriage counseling as well. We all grieve differently and often for an extended time. You never get past it. A family has enough to deal with in the loss; we felt there should be a way to help with the rest," Steve said.

Steve met Vern Henricks, President and CEO of the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation (GMCF), at a meeting and attended the GMCF Semi-Annual Trustees Meeting, where grant recipients talk about the programs they are doing in our community. This had quite an impact on he and Diana. They discussed it and decided to see what they might be able to do. Steve made an appointment to speak with Vern to see how he and the staff at GMCF might be able to help. Diana said, "They made it incredibly simple to set up a fund and the staff was and is always available to help and assist."

The "Taken Too Soon" Fund was established with GMCF. The Havenstein's met with their extended family to let them know what they were doing. Several family members asked if they could match their donation to begin the Fund, and they happily agreed. The Fund has grown well under GMCF guidance, but they want it to continue to grow, enabling the Fund to assist more families.

"We now have a living memorial to our son, Greg, our parents and cousins. We are helping families in the community and are very pleased with the result!" said Steve.

The House Cafe, Inc.

The House Cafe, Inc. is a coffee shop in Odgen, KS. They pride themselves on being a high quality one. They also sell boba tea, and have a bakery where everything is made from scratch. But, they are more than a business.

After working with teens in Ogden, KS for five years, Chris and Quinn Jacobs felt a calling to do something to confront trends they witnessed in the local youth. Poverty, drugs, jail, teen pregnancy, suicide and more.



Teens volunteer here, they start at "Front of House" and do every thankless job; sweeping floors, washing windows, cleaning bathrooms. But, the purpose is that they learn to be faithful in the little things of life. By working hard they can be promoted to dishes, then cash register and making bubble tea's, and then to a barista. The last stage is a paid internship where we help them build resume's, practice mock job interviews, learn how to build a budget, and more. ~Chris Jacobs

GMCF has provided \$34,200 in grant funding to The House Cafe, Inc. from several of our grant programs since they began in 2017. The first grant was to help them refurbish the house that would eventually become The House Cafe. The most recent grant was from the Deihl Community Grants program to help fund a low income child care facility in Ogden.

Morning Star, Inc.

Morning Star Inc. is a non-profit mental health recovery center that offers peer support services in a safe, trusting and healthy environment. Their mission is to empower people through mental health and substance use recovery, to break through the barriers of stigma, while decreasing isolation and hospitalizations.



“Before I came to Morning Star, I was hospitalized often for mental health illnesses. When I was diagnosed with Schizoaffective Disorder, they told me I was unemployable, would never have a meaningful relationship, and that I wouldn’t even be able to take care of a pet. When I came to Morning Star I was broken, but everyone here is so understanding and accepting. Through peer-to-peer support and groups, I have gained confidence and dignity. I now have a job and am pursuing a BS degree at Kansas State University. I have hope, friendships, and a belief in a great future for myself.”

Since 2013, GMCF has provided over \$65,000 in funding to Morning Star, Inc. These grants have provided technology updates and helped with transportation costs allowing them to hire a driver to get members to activities and medical appointments. Without this support, many of them could not take part in all of the services that help them so much.

Toys For Manhattan..... \$ 2,000

Receives new and “experienced” toys, books, games, clothing, and gifts for distribution at no cost to Manhattan families in need.

In 2015, the Manhattan Community Memorial Fund was created to endow pooled memorial gifts in memory of loved ones having local roots or connections to the area. Through the combined gifts made to the foundation to honor these individuals, the principal continues to grow. From the earnings of this Fund, year after year, GMCF makes annual grants in the Manhattan community.

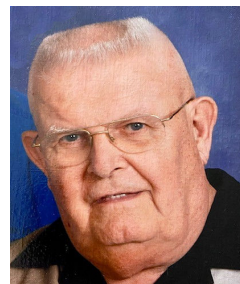

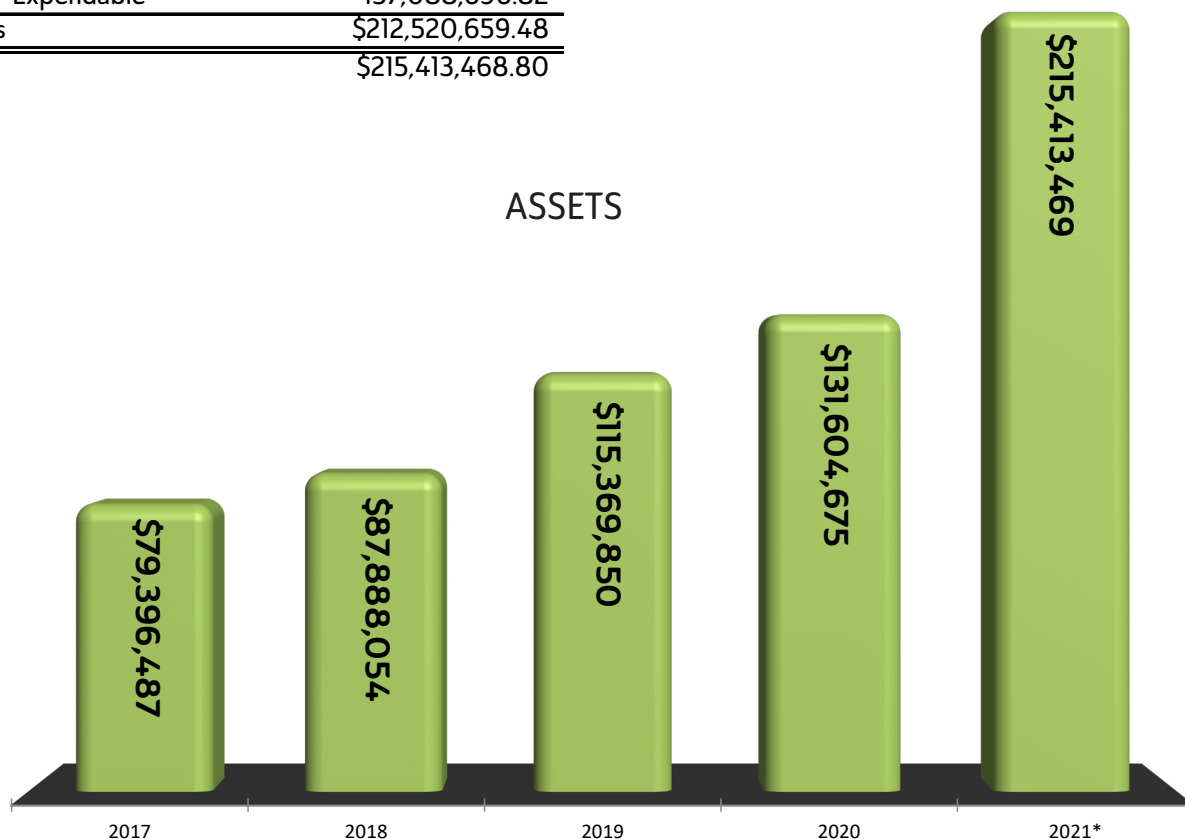

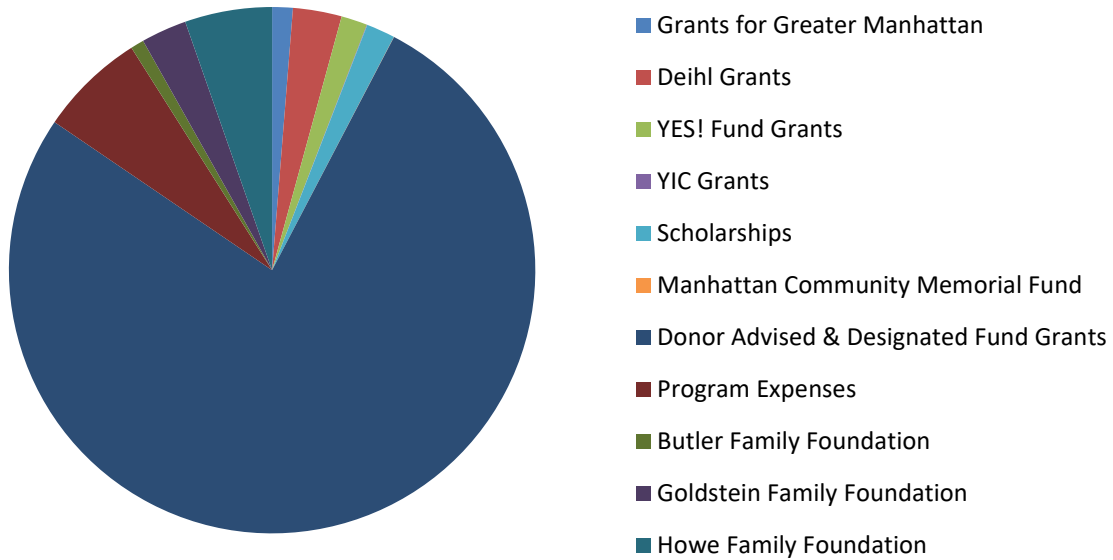

PARTNERS - ASSOCIATES - EDUCATIONAL PARTNERS

The **GMCF PARTNER PROGRAM** evolved from the continued growth of communities and foundations wanting to partner with the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation (GMCF). Partners of GMCF maintain a board and decision making authority of their funds and GMCF handles the financial responsibilities for the foundations so they are able to focus their efforts on supporting charitable needs in their communities.

Community Foundations associated with GMCF were initially called affiliates. As the number of affiliates grew and some held 501(c)(3) status, we renamed the program to “Partners”, with those without 501(c)(3) status remaining as “Affiliates” and those with 501(c)(3) status being referred to as “Associates”. The school foundations are referred to as “Educational Associates”.

GMCF welcomes all communities that wish to affiliate. As part of the affiliation process, GMCF will:

- assist each community with assessment, feasibility, and formation discussions
- provide technical assistance services including long range planning, board development, marketing & communications
- provide endowment campaign planning throughout the lifetime of affiliation

If existing community foundations wish to become a Partner with GMCF they must agree to adhere to GMCF policies and guidelines. All Affiliate Partners share the GMCF 501(c)(3) and are part of the same corporate entity. Associate Partner foundations may elect to retain their separate 501(c)(3) status. Associate and Educational Associate foundations must follow the same procedures as all Partners.

Communities that become Partners within GMCF effectively pool resources for community betterment, benefit from experienced investment and administration services, and generate increased awareness of community needs and citizens’ philanthropy.

EDUCATIONAL PARTNERS: The Greater Manhattan Community Foundation works with three Educational Partners to manage scholarship administration. We currently work with the Clay County Educational Endowment Association (Clay Center Community Improvement Foundation), Manhattan-Ogden Public Schools Foundation (Greater Manhattan Community Foundation) and USD 113 Foundation (Greater Sabetha Community Foundation). Both Clay Center and Sabetha have those funds established with each of their community foundations.

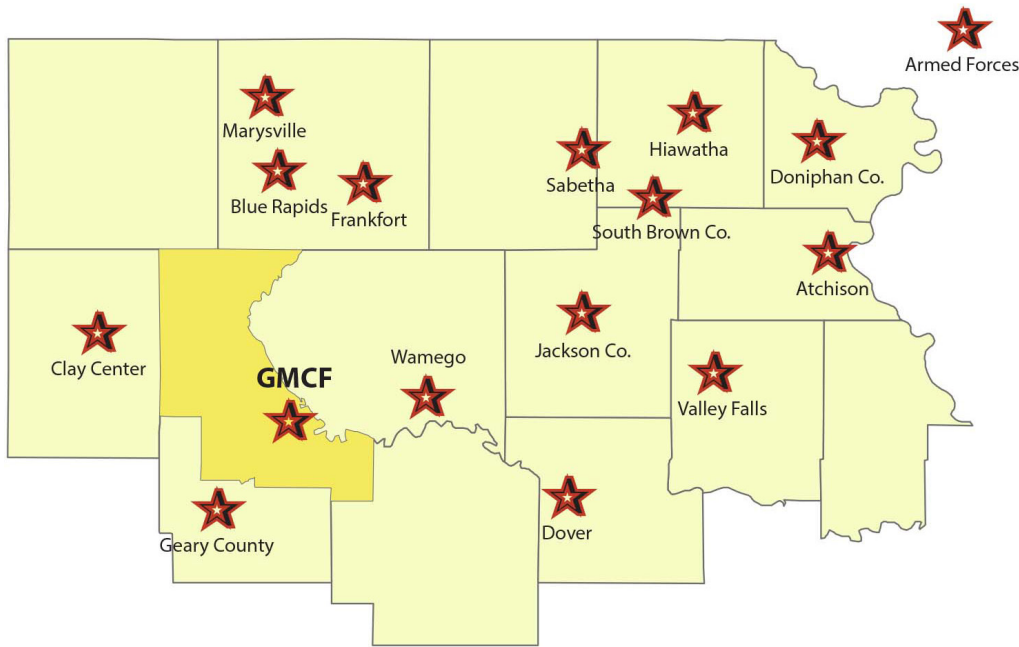

Public art adds enormous value to the cultural, aesthetic and economic vitality of a community. It creates a sense of place and builds social capital.

Public art installations bring people together, making art accessible to everyone and inspiring engagement and a sense of belonging to a community. It forms points of pride and interest for visitors and impacts the beauty and overall feel of a city.

What would it look like, from a visitor's standpoint, for someone to say that Manhattan is a community that embraces public art? We have seen murals popping up all over Manhattan, and that is a great start. Our goal is to expand public art projects and opportunities for artists to increase art visibility and access. Public art has the potential to create the community identity and sense of place that are particularly important for determining where people want to live.

The New GMCF Community Arts Committee

The Greater Manhattan Community Foundation has formed the Community Arts Committee (CAC) with the purpose of promoting and supporting public art projects in the Greater Manhattan community. This Public Art lifestyle will offer a vibrant and colorful environment that is free and open to the public.

The CAC will identify locations for public art projects, and processes to receive grant proposals for public art projects. The CAC will evaluate and select art projects to be funded by the Lincoln and Dorothy Deihl Community Grants Program.

The GMCF has also established the Community Arts Endowed Fund to provide resources to organizations that foster practice, education, accessibility and appreciation of the arts for the benefit of the Greater Manhattan community. Citizens and guests will benefit from the impact of temporary and permanent public art initiatives and installations.

Be watching as several public art projects are planned for 2022 that will embrace partnerships and collaborations throughout Manhattan.



You may have noticed several murals showing up around Manhattan lately. Many of these are a result of a grant from the Lincoln & Dorothy Deihl Community Grants Program. 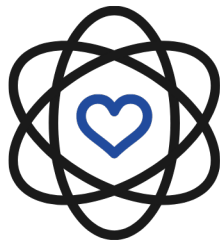
