Message from the **President & CEO**

What a year! As I reflect on 2023, my 11th year as President & CEO, I continue to be humbled and grateful for the generosity of the communities we serve. When the audited numbers are finalized, the assets of the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation will reflect an amazing amount of support for the numerous charities that we help and champion. I'd like to break these numbers further down for all to view.

In 2010, GMCF received a generous contribution from Steel & Pipe Supply's closely held stock, totaling more than \$21 million. That gift more than doubled the \$10+ million in assets of the Foundation at that time. Thanks to the continued leadership of the SPS Companies, those assets have exceeded \$167 million. These stock assets, combined with the \$172+ million in other assets from our 1,600+ funds of the Foundation, bring us to a combined total of \$339 million in our unaudited report as of December 31, 2023. It is important to note that \$55.3 million of these assets are under the designation of our 19 partner communities in Northeast Kansas.

Some feel that partnering with GMCF requires funds to be endowed, which is far from the truth. It is up to the fund representative(s) to determine if funds are endowed or expendable. Endowed funds in 2023 totaled \$30.8 million for GMCF and \$9.3 million for our Partners.

To further describe the impact of our more than 1,600+ fundholders, GMCF has distributed more than \$75 million in grants, more than \$2 million in scholarships, and added 17 additional partner communities in the past ten years. This has all been accomplished because of the 14 full and part-time employees of GMCF.

GMCF has worked closely with the Manhattan Area Chamber of Commerce to tackle issues of most importance as well as the City in support of art and youth activities. In 2023, our community leaders discussed childcare, housing, economic development, workforce development, and quality of life. Those discussions resulted in the submission and receipt of \$5.6M in state and federal-funded grants to build the eventual Flint Hills Community Accelerator/Child Care Business Accelerator with the expected 3rd quarter dedication in 2025.

When I joined GMCF in 2013, I aimed to make Manhattan known for its philanthropy. After GMCF's growth and rise to the largest community foundation in Kansas, it is time to evaluate the next phase of GMCF's impact.

In summary, 2023 was a year of new horizons. We continue to challenge our board, trustees, and staff to meet the emerging needs around us. We continue to strengthen our relationships with fundholders and prioritize partnerships. We continue to build relationships with donors and community needs. We thank everyone for supporting GMCF and extend blessings to all.

The mission at GMCF holds strong. We have continued to build relationships between donors and community needs. At GMCF, we take great pride in supporting our local non-profit organizations. That will always be our number one focus.

However, our board is aware that the community needs in Manhattan are changing. Due to the growth and success of GMCF, we have been asked to become more involved with solving local issues. These requests are not taken lightly, and we are committed to developing a strategic plan to provide structure as these opportunities arise.

We have committed to two initiatives this year: The Manhattan Parks and Recreation Foundation, which allows our donors to enhance those programs directly, and The Flint Hills Community Accelerator (FHCA). While the FHCA began as a childcare initiative, it has grown in scope. The building will now house the Flint Hills Childcare Business Accelerator, MATC (Education), Heartland Works (Workforce), and the Manhattan Free Clinic (Health). You will continue to be updated about the FHCA as we break ground on a building utilizing over six million grant dollars.

I appreciate and thank everyone involved with GMCF this past year. Whether you started a new fund, donated through an existing fund, participated in our Grow Green Match Day, or volunteered your time by serving on one of our many committees, I thank you. I also want to thank the staff, who works tirelessly, the board, who has been most supportive, and the Trustees for your input and service. It certainly takes a village!

In 2023, GMCF hosted the 11th Annual Grow Green Match Day, raising \$2,029,084. On this day, eligible gifts made through GMCF receive a 50% match to support local nonprofit organizations. Each organization can receive up to \$10,000 in matching dollars. All gifts made to the organization on Grow Green Match Day are deposited into the organization's spendable fund to be used for immediate needs. The match is deposited into the organization's endowed fund, ensuring a sustainable funding source over the long term.

Thank you to Phil Howe and the Howe Family Foundation for the matching funds for this event. Since 2013, Phil has provided over \$2.6 million in matching funds for Grow Green Match Day.

The GMCF Partner program evolved in response to the growing interest of communities and foundations wanting to collaborate with the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation. A GMCF Partner maintains its own board and decision-making authority for funds, while GMCF handles financial responsibilities. In 2023, GMCF added three new partners: Rural Riley County, Greater Perry Area, and Alma. The program now hosts twenty partners across Kansas.

Also, in 2023, GMCF assisted 14 partners in facilitating match days to support their local communities. These matching events were amplified through the support of the Patterson Family Foundation's Rural Community Foundation Match grant program. Through this program, rural community foundations could receive up to \$70,000 in matching grant funds for their match event. Through the program, GMCF partners received \$967,446 from the grant program and raised \$6,996,532 for local Kansas communities.

Flint Hills Community Accelerator

The Flint Hills Community Accelerator (FHCA) provides a coordinated, comprehensive, and collaborative approach to meeting the needs of the Manhattan community. The FHCA provides space for implementing partners to offer community services in four pillar areas:

- Childcare: Child Care Business Accelerator will provide training for new childcare business owners
- Work: Heartland Works will help accelerate employment placement needs
- Education: Manhattan Area Technical College will provide training and services to support a skilled workforce to meet community job needs, including childcare
- Health: Manhattan Free Clinic will provide healthcare monitoring and services for the underserved and those without health insurance

Specifically, the Child Care Business Accelerator will support and train childcare business owners as they launch new businesses. The FHCA will provide facility operating space for eight childcare programs operating as independent businesses under one roof. Because the City of Manhattan has a high percentage of families that rent homes, getting the support of a landlord to allow the operation of child care as a home-based business can be a barrier to licensing and operations. The FHCA will address barriers to licensing and operations in rental-based homes by providing a state-of-the-art childcare space that allows family childcare businesses to launch with the benefit of support services. The new facility will provide a total of 96 new childcare slots and serve an estimated 1,665 individuals a year:

• 16 infant slots (0-12 months)

- 32 preschool slots (2 ½ 5 years)
- 32 toddler slots (12 months $2\frac{1}{2}$ years)
- 16 school age slots (6-12 years)

All FHCA programs will accept DCF and Raising Riley subsidies, helping to ensure low-income families in the community are better served. Also, programs that offer evening, overnight, and weekend care will be created to meet the need for child care that aligns with work hours of the service industry, medical staff, and first responders. This recruitment strategy will ensure that childcare is available in the building 24 hours a day, seven days a week (holidays excluded).

Start-up support services will also include: job training to meet childcare licensing requirements, mentoring support from other seasoned childcare business owners, assistance with marketing recruitment to fill enrollment, and access to qualified substitute teaching staff, teacher resources, age-appropriate curriculum, and community volunteers. After the initial 12-month operating agreement period, facility owners/operators will transition childcare business into the community (with support), and another new owner/operator will be recruited to assume their building space.

As of February 2024, the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation has now acquired \$9,052,954.00 in funding for this project: \$3.5 million from the Capital Projects Fund Accelerator, \$2,172,954 million from the Kansas Children's Cabinet Child Care Capacity Accelerator grant program, and \$3,380,000 in locally raised in-kind and cash donations.

Manhattan Parks & Recreation Foundation

GMCF was pleased to assist our community's volunteer leaders in forming the new Manhattan Parks and Recreation Foundation. The purpose of this fund is to support the financial needs of our families with young children to participate in Manhattan Parks and Recreation Department programs for their personal growth and development.

Community Cares **Chest**

The Community Cares Chest initiative started with a discussion between the Manhattan Rotary Club and the Overland Park Rotary Club, with a donation of books, which developed into a relationship with Feed the Children. Local partners with GMCF that continue to support and provide a vital resource for our nonprofits include the Manhattan Rotary Club, Konza United Way, University Christian Church, the Lincoln and Dorothy Deihl Fund, and the Leadership Manhattan class, which helped develop the name.





Through this endeavor, we receive free products from various suppliers to distribute to charitable organizations. Products include books, face masks, personal care items, household cleaning items, laundry detergent, clothing, food items, water, and flavored drinks.

Since its inception, the Community Cares Chest program has received seventeen truckloads of items with approximately \$3.2 million in actual retail costs.

The GMCF Investment Committee meets quarterly to assess investment performance compared to established benchmarks, review asset allocations, and address other investment-related matters of the Foundation.







The Greater Manhattan Community Foundation is committed to expanding public art in our community through the GMCF Community Arts Committee (CAC). The CAC serves as a granting committee composed of GMCF trustees. The grant cycle is open year-round, with the committee approving grants quarterly. Projects are funded by the Lincoln and Dorothy Deihl Community Grants Program and through public donations to the GMCF Community Arts fund. In 2023, the Community Arts Program funded 14 projects in Manhattan and the surrounding area.



A grant was awarded to USD 383, enabling the creation of a stunning, large-scale mural on the Anderson Avenue side of Lee Elementary. This mural pays homage to the school's rich and diverse history through vibrant colors and meaningful imagery. It is a powerful addition to the Manhattan, KS, community and elementary schools.



A grant was awarded to the Butler Family Foundation for a mural on the outside of their office building, located in Aggieville. Look for not-so-hidden gems from Manhattan history in this vibrant image of contemporary life. Created by Janson Rapisarda from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.



A grant was awarded to fund a mural at 512 Poyntz Avenue in Manhattan, KS. The mural was completed by Joseph Renda and titled Day After Day. The mural captures the essence of the working-class citizen, drawing connections between their hard work and the sacrifices made by our animal counterparts to support us.

GMCF Annual Meeting & Community Foundation Awards

The Community Foundation Awards (CFAs) started in 2014 as an addition to the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation's Annual Meeting. Military **Relations**

In the heart of Kansas and the Flint Hills stands the Army's historic 1st Infantry Division, home to service members and their families, serving the retirees and veterans of the surrounding communities. GMCF's Military Relations program continues its support of the military in the area by connecting the military to the community in which they live. GMCF continues to connect the Community Cares Chest with the service members of Fort Riley to provide products to our military families on Fort Riley and to our deployed soldiers.

The GMCF Military Relations program continues to grow, working with nonprofits, local chambers, city and county governments, and the local military. The program furthers the goals of these organizations to better the communities in which they live, work, and play. This year, the program is working with the Gold Star Family Support Fund (Est. 2023), our congressional staff, and the Society of the 1st Infantry Division to provide the opportunity for Gold Star families from the Flint Hills region to see the names of their soldiers on the Monument.

The Armed Forces Community Foundation (AFCF) is an Affiliate of GMCF and has 28 fundholders from around the Flint Hills Region. Last year, the AFCF was awarded a grant from the Patterson Family Foundation Rural Community Grant program for up to \$70,000. AFCF's Stand-To Match Day was held on Veterans Day, and over \$57,000 was raised in donations. Coupled with the match, Stand-To Match Day raised \$114,000. These funds help soldiers, families, veterans, retirees, and those connected with the military community.

We know that the military family could live anywhere in the world. At GMCF, through the Military Relations program, we work with all the military to share ways to contribute to the community in which they live. We inspire and share knowledge of a community foundation by providing the resources to help make mindful decisions to strengthen and support the community they have come to call home.

GMCF Staff **Expansion**

In 2023, GMCF welcomed four new team members, launching a new era of philanthropic advancement in the Manhattan community. First was the hire of Taylor Veatch, GMCF's new student intern. Second, the hire of Aimee Nelson. Aimee began as the executive assistant until transitioning into the Wamego Community Foundation's Director after the retirement of Mike McCall later in the year. Third, Stacy Smith was hired to fill the executive assistant position and manage grants for the Flint Hills Community Accelerator. Lastly, Connie Joy was hired to assist Leslie Scoby with the Greater Sabetha Community Foundation.

GMCF also saw the retirement of long-time Wamego Community Foundation (WCF) Director, Michael (Mike) McCall. Since becoming Executive Director in 2017 Mike has guided the WCF (GMCF Partner) through significant growth and transformation. Under his leadership, the Foundation saw

a surge in financial resources and community outreach throughout his seven years, with funds increasing from 85 to 173 and donations soaring from \$224,470 to \$1,132,857. Mike's pivotal role in launching Wamego Match Day in 2019 catalyzed community support, raising \$501,687 in 2023 alone. His efforts also led to a remarkable increase in WCF's assets, from \$1,756,708 in 2017 to \$5,520,592 in 2023.
