

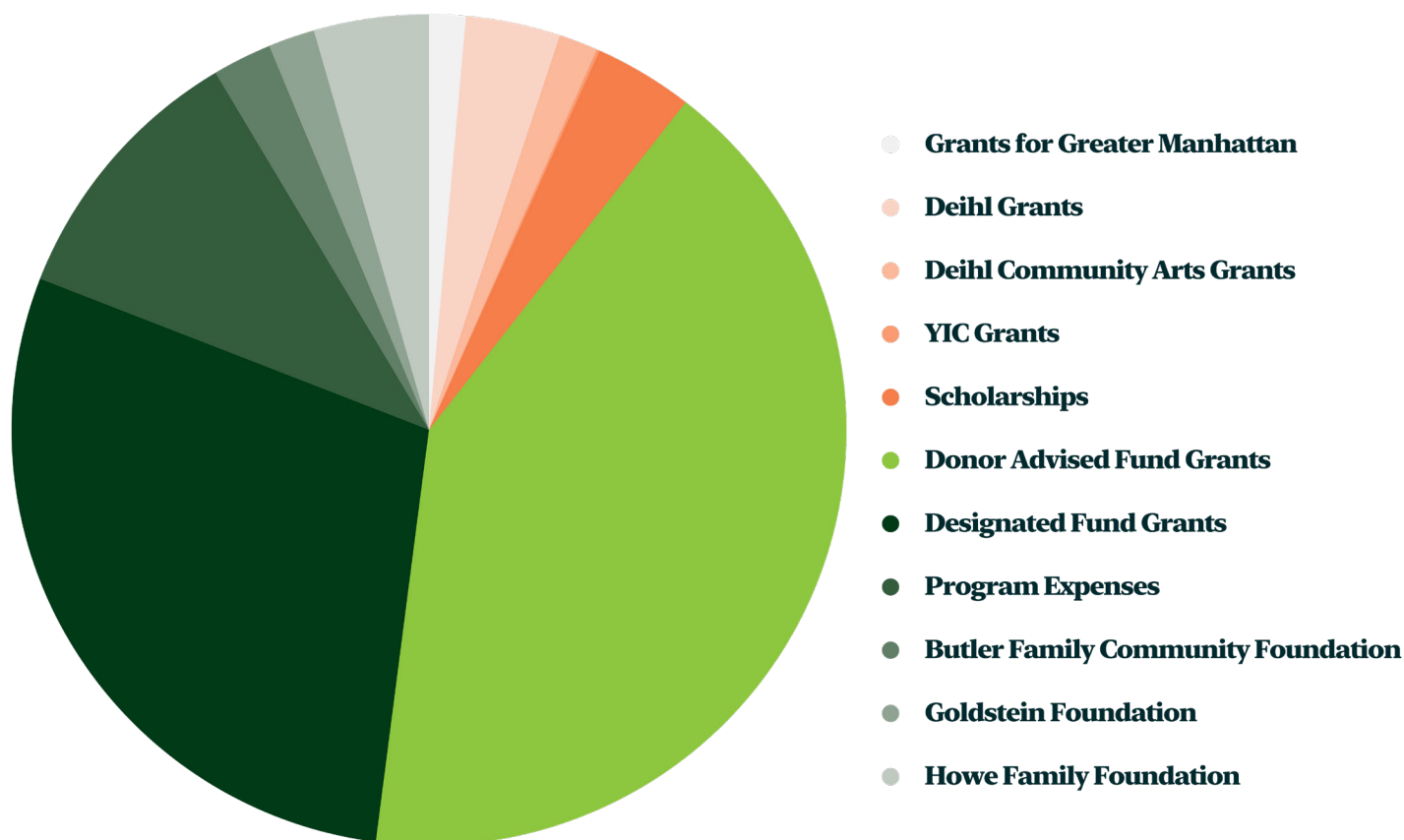

Across the Palette: Provides a wide range of arts programs offering painting, metal smithing, clay classes, group stringed instrument lessons and youth theatre programs.

Collaborative Coaching Case Manager: Training coaches to help neighbors improve relationships, careers, and everyday lives. Coaches clarify goals and create strategies for overcoming obstacles.

Catholic Charities of Northern Kansas, Inc. \$10,000
Diaper Program Support: Program provides diapering supplies to income-qualifying households monthly to facilitate the health and well-being of babies and toddlers.

Crisis Center, Inc. \$10,000
Riley County Police Response Advocate Program: Project between RCPD and Crisis Center that assures victims of DV have access to services at the moment of law enforcement intervention.

Downtown Farmers Market \$8,000
Market Match for SNAP, Senior Nutrition Program, WIC: Doubles dollars for SNAP and Senior Coupons, provides access to fresh produce for at-risk, i.e. WIC participants and Head Start students.

Flint Hills Community Clinic \$10,000
Access to Healthcare: Build website, social media, and print campaign that integrates with social services infrastructure. This will bring fresh information to the general public, target population, referral sources, social services agencies, and the medical community.

Flint Hills Volunteer Center, Inc. \$10,000
FHVC Suicide Awareness P.A.C.T.: Further the mission of providing awareness on suicide, depression, mental health, bullying, and diversity through our FHVC Suicide Awareness P.A.C.T. (Prevention, Awareness, Compassion, Training) program.

Good Shepherd Homecare & Hospice \$10,000
Charitable Care: Subsidizes care provided to seniors, specifically those receiving assistance through the Older Americans Act, Senior Care Act, and Caregiver Grants.

Housing & Credit Counseling, Inc. \$8,500
HCCI & Powercat Financial Outreach & Partnership Work in Riley County: Provide marketing and outreach for HUD approved Housing and Financial and Home Buyer Counseling so households earning modest incomes can reduce debt, build credit and be financially self-sufficient.

Housing MHK Fund \$8,500
Resident Services Program: Begin a new Public Housing Resident Services Program for families housed in Manhattan Housing Authority properties. This partnership between Housing MHK and Manhattan Housing Authority encourages, promotes, and enhances Resident Services.

Laundry Love MHK \$5,000
Monthly Events: Assistance to families that experience a burdensome financial impact when washing laundry each month allowing the reallocation of laundry-specific funds to greater needs.

Manhattan Emergency Shelter, Inc. \$5,000
Caroline Peine Transitional Shelter: Provide emergency shelter for homeless adults and children and wrap-around services to help client transition into community in a self-sustaining manner.

Morning Star, Inc. \$10,000
Transportation Program: Van driver, who connects one of the most vulnerable populations in Manhattan to needed services, i.e. doctor appointments, pharmacies, free community dinners, etc.

Pawnee Mental Health, Inc. \$10,000
Discovery Sober Living House: The House will provide a safe place where men with substance use disorder and mental illness can live and learn to live their lives substance-free and learn skills necessary to find a job and safe and affordable housing that promotes sobriety.

Adult Services Mental Health Assistance: Mental health/psychological and medication evaluations, prescription assistance, drug/alcohol services, and transition housing for clients.	
Riley County Health Department	\$8,500
Care Line: Provides emergency assistance to patients and their families for needs not covered by insurance or charity care, i.e. prescriptions, medical equipment, and temporary lodging.	
UFM Community Learning Center	\$4,000
Project EXCEL: Personal enrichment classes held on the K-State Campus for individuals with mild developmental disabilities or other cognitive disabilities.	
Boys & Girls Club of Manhattan	\$7,500
Summer Field Trip Program: Summer programming of educational/recreational opportunities to youth, i.e. Wildcat Fitness Mini-Golf, AMC Movies, and bowling at the KSU Union.	
First Tee - Manhattan	\$8,500
Manhattan Programs: Scholarships for golf program participation.	
Flint Hills Children's Choir	\$1,000
2023 Regional Spring Tour: Students participate in multi-state tour and perform with other choirs from Kansas and Nebraska, with a final performance at St. Isidore's in Manhattan.	
Flint Hills Foster Teen Camps	\$5,000
Camp Scholarships: Project support for a safe, fun, structured experience where foster teens can start healing from their past, find hope, and start realizing they can take their futures back.	
Flint Hills Summer Fun Camp	\$5,000
General Support: Provides a structured, fun summer experience that promotes academic, communication, and social goals for children grades 1-12 with autism-spectrum disorders.	
Girls on the Run of the Flint Hills	\$10,000
Scholarship Support: Support for physical activity-based, positive youth development programming among underserved girls in the Manhattan community.	
Infant Toddler Services of Riley County	\$5,000
LENA Home Program Equipment: Purchase of LENA (Language Environment Analysis) home system technology, vest that records childrens' speech. The information is analyzed by their software and shared adults make increases with interactive talk with their children.	
Kids Bike Recycling	\$5,000
Recycling and Bike Swaps: Donated bikes are restored and distributed to children to engage in physical activity and transportation to school. Bike Swaps held in Manhattan City Park (March) and Ogden Community Center (August), with 350 bicycles transported for distribution.	
Ogden Elementary School Panther Power Club.	\$6,000
STEAMing Across Kansas: Summer program for fifty low-income Ogden Elementary youth. Students visit Living Water Ranch weekly and take part in programming infused with standards-based learning in a hands-on outdoor classroom.	
No Stone Unturned Foundation, Inc.	\$10,000
Information Technology and Cyber Risk Management: Partner with IT risk management company to provide upgraded cyber security and perform 24/7 monitoring to ensure illegal infiltration is stopped before the privacy of our patients is compromised.	
Royal Family KIDS of Manhattan	\$5,000
Summer Camp: Provide support for a camp for abused and neglected children in the foster care system, take part in activities such as swimming, archery, woodworking, crafts, and hiking.	
Riley County EMS	\$2,000
Safe Kids Riley County: Provides safety car seats for low-income families and proper car seat installation education for all.	
Stormont Vail Foundation	\$1,500
Care Line-Emergency Assistance for Manhattan Area Families of NIC Babies: Supports needs that are typically not covered by health insurance or charity care. Examples are prescriptions, medical equipment, transportation, meals, and temporary housing.

Sustainability: Three full-time staff who are both dual-role family victim advocates and forensic interviewers work with RCPD, Department of Children and Families, foster parents, and the FBI to build connections with our Ft. Riley neighbors.	
Sunflower Children's Collective: Sunflower Bridge Child Exchange/Visitation Center	\$3,334
Sustainability: Support the 15-20 volunteers and director at CEVC with an increase in demand for visits and exchanges with a larger room for families and a second room for exchanges.	
Sunflower Children's Collective: Sunflower Court Appointed Special Advocate	\$3,334
Sustainability: Support the salary of a full-time director of Sunflower CASA who oversees volunteers, maintains records as an increasing number of children need their services.	
Thrive! Flint Hills Foundation	\$10,000
Teen Thrive: Work with teens (15-19) from families that struggle financially to learn life skills to set and achieve goals for the best chance at success to break the cycle of generation poverty.	
True Colors Flint Hills	\$10,000
Direct Client Assistance: Provide funds to provide mental health services to youth ages 12-18 experiencing depression, anxiety, and other severe mental illness at no cost to them.

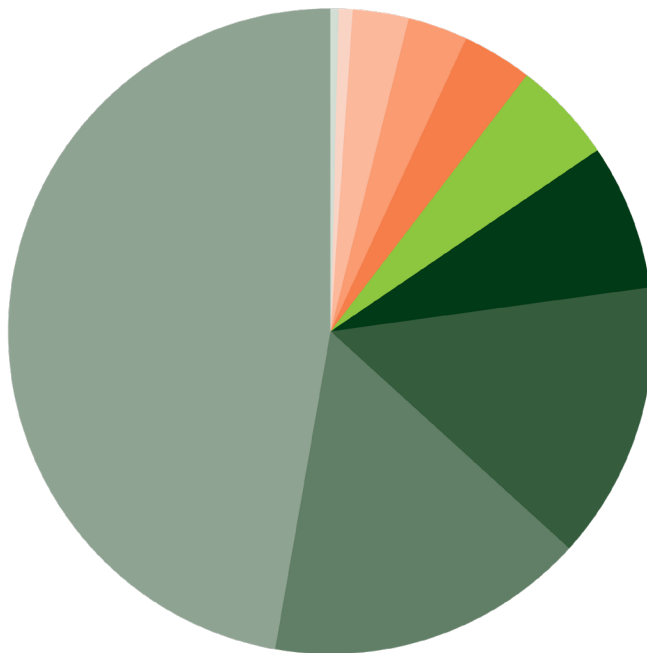
